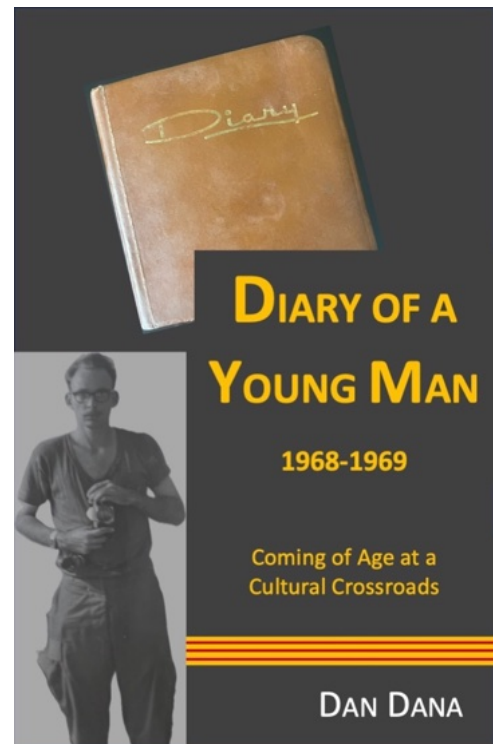


## Summary\*

*Diary of a Young Man, 1968-1969* is a candid, first-person memoir built from the author's recovered journal entries from a formative six-month period in late 1968 and early 1969. The diary follows a 23-year-old Army clerk as he finishes his Vietnam service and moves through a restless sequence of experiences in Vietnam, the Philippines, Central America, and Panama, all while trying to understand who he is and what sort of life he wants to build. What emerges is not a polished retrospective but a raw time capsule of a young man thinking aloud in real time.

The book's central movement is outward and inward at once. On the outside, the narrator hitchhikes, travels by boat and bus, meets strangers and lovers, recovers from a motorcycle crash, and drifts toward the end of military service and the beginning of civilian life. Internally, he wrestles with questions of freedom, sexuality, politics, religion, intelligence, ambition, and authenticity, often testing ideas against immediate experience. The diary captures a mind in motion, unsure of its future but intensely alert to the world around it.

A major part of the book's appeal lies in its unfiltered voice. The entries preserve the texture of the original notebook writing, including digressions, blunt judgments, erotic encounters, philosophical reflections, and uneasy self-scrutiny. At the same time, the author's retrospective framing gives the diary a second layer of meaning: the reader can see, in these youthful notes, the seeds of the life that followed, including graduate study, a career in mediation and teaching, marriage, travel, and later literary work.



The memoir also functions as a cultural document. It places one young American's coming-of-age inside the upheavals of the Vietnam era, the counterculture, and a changing global landscape, where war, travel, language, class, sex, and ideology all collide. The result is a vivid record of a generation at a crossroads, told with unusual candor and a strong sense of historical immediacy.

Ultimately, *Diary of a Young Man* is about becoming through experience. It shows a young man stumbling, observing, desiring, and thinking his way toward adulthood, while the older author reframes that journey as the beginning of a life still unfolding. The diary's power comes from its honesty: it lets the reader witness both the confusion of the moment and the shape of the life that later emerged from it.
